Testimony to Senate Finance Committee

on SB 2, Article VII, Business & Economic Development February 26, 2015

I am Ed Heimlich, a Citizen of Texas, here to testify on the necessity for our Legislature to pay the attached Final Judgment representing a Legal and Moral obligation of the State. This is necessary to preserve and advance the business and economic development of Texas.

The greatest incentive that any State can offer to business for economic development is Liberty.
